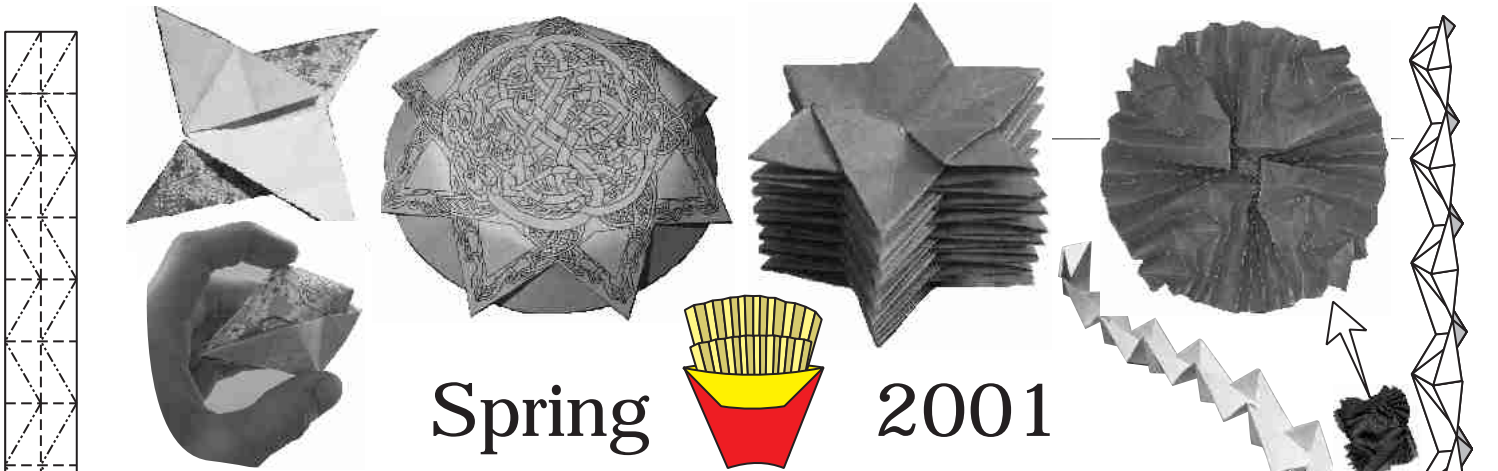


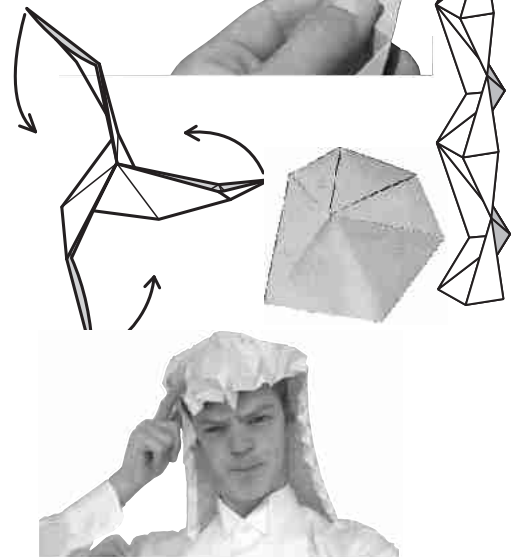
Bay Area Rapid Folders Newsletter
